


- Also this year, the College community has shown outstanding responses to the earthquake devastation in Haiti. Student groups assembled and distributed information to campuses about ways to help. Mike Dupuy '81 used his personal connections to establish a direct relief fund. And Michelle Mays '02, last seen volunteering in India, traveled to Haiti to continue her volunteer work with Medecins Sans Frontieres (Doctors Without Borders).
- The Commons building on the Takoma Park/Silver Spring Campus has reopened after a complete makeover inside. The building is home to a collection of historical memorabilia from the Bliss Electrical School, which the College purchased to establish its first campus. You'll read more about the collection in this issue.

And finally, because I wear another hat as a member of the Montgomery College Foundation board, I'm pleased to say that the College has surpassed its goal of raising \$25 million in a multiyear campaign effort. Thanks to your generosity, our current students have benefited from scholarships, better classrooms, and a wider range of learning programs. Please continue to support the College through your gifts to the Annual Fund—or to your Alumni Association's scholarship fund.

Counting Their Blessings

Raised in Montgomery County by supportive and practical parents, the eight Patton siblings learned the importance of hard work, education, and giving back through more than three decades at MC.

ollege after high school was an irrevocable truth for each of Barbara and Bob Patton's 10 children.

"We knew from an early age... not going to college was not an option," says Bobby Patton '83, number six in the family lineup. Like many Montgomery County residents, eight Pattons chose Montgomery College for its proximity to home, work, and


family, and its affordability.

Each Patton sibling knew MC would be the means to their end goal: a four-year degree. Throughout the 1970s, 1980s, and 1990s, eight of them attended the College.

"Financially, it made the most sense to take all my core classes at MC, then transfer to a fouryear school," says Beverly Patton Zolfaghari '87.

According to Buffy (Patton)
Wiltz '91, assuming financial
responsibility for tuition had an
upside: "It made us good students.
Since I was paying for it, I did not
want to miss class or lose credits.... I also knew if I did well, I would
transfer successfully to a four-year
school, with financial aid, of course."

Most of the Pattons attended the same campus, Rockville, but each had a unique experience. Bruce '75, the first to enroll, remembers enjoying his math and sociology classes; younger brother Barry '79 recalls meeting up with friends in the cafeteria for card games between classes. Beverly was on the dance squad. Buffy went to class, then right to work.





Although none were English majors, four Pattons remember Dr. Gary Pittenger as their favorite/most memorable professor. Pittenger taught English at Rockville from 1971 to 2001. "He was hard but fair," says Burt '85; "He taught me how to write," says Beverly, adding: "He was hard! He really challenged you to be better."

Bobby learned one of his most valuable life lessons from math Professor Gordon Gregg (who taught from 1971 to 2004). "At the start of class, Professor Gregg closed and locked his door. If you were late, even a minute, you missed class. On the day of a major test, I was literally two feet from

the door and he closed it. I had to retake the class. Besides mastering linear algebra, I learned that in life—and in business— 20 percent is being there; 80 percent is being there ON TIME."

After Bobby transferred to the University of Maryland, their father Robert suffered a heart attack. By that time, the older siblings had already moved out and started careers and families of their own. At age 20, Bobby asked his dad about starting a business. "I wanted to be able to take care of the family if something happened to him."

Doubting mightily, according to Bobby, their father gave him and brother Burt

(then age 18) a sum of \$5,000 each to start a business. It was May 1984. Working in the basement, the brothers assembled kits of networking equipment, imported from Australia and Israel through their father's business contacts. They named the venture Patton Electronics.

Bobby and Burt set up work shifts around their class schedules, one working mornings and one working afternoons. Using relatively archaic machinery, they assembled tiny components (too small to handle) to boards, then tested them. They sold the finished parts-modems and line drivers for connecting terminals to main-

frame computers—to larger manufacturers in the budding telecommunications industry.

Bruce—already married with small children and employed at Westinghouse—started moonlighting in the evenings to help them boost output. With his expertise in production processes, and their combined efforts, the company generated \$130,000 in its first year, yielding a \$20,000 profit.

"Burt and I used those profits to purchase two Honda Accords, which could get us back and forth to campus," says Bobby.

Their second year in business, the trio tripled their income, grossing \$300,000. Needing to grow their inventory and product line, they asked dad again for help. He contributed \$100,000 by selling off some

property. A couple years later (1996), Bob Patton Sr. joined the company as CEO.

Today, four Pattons report to work full time at the family business: Bruce, Bobby, Burt, and Buffy. Brothers Ben '77 and Barry started separate businesses. Ben, a CPA, opened his own firm in 1984. As principal of Patton and Braucht, P.C., located in Vienna, Va., he oversees the firm's tax department and quality control program.

In 1989, Barry founded Data Connect Enterprises, a Maryland corporation headquartered in Olney, Md. The multimillion dollar enterprise primarily distributes networking equipment and is one of Patton Electronics' largest distributors with subsidiaries in Texas and Pennsylvania. Sisters Beverly and Barbara are exploring other careers: Beverly is a self-employed interior designer; Barbara (who worked at Patton Electronics while attending Montgomery College) is now a math professor at Northern Virginia Community College.

While they are busy running their own businesses, raising families, and volunteering with professional, community, and church organizations, the Patton family continues to grow and prosper. "The latest count is around 83 immediate family members," says Bobby. "My mother would know for sure."

Thanksgiving and Christmas—family centered holidays—are among their

annual favorites. "It's the one time of year we get to see everyone together," says Barbara. "At Thanksgiving, we split up and share the main meal at each other's houses. Then, we get all together for dessert in the afternoon."

While the food may be better, and the laughs a little louder... as family gatherings go, this one looks a bit like an MC alumni chapter meeting—especially now that it includes additional members. Bruce has sent five of his eight children to the College. And, while the other Pattons are still parenting younger children, they anticipate making decisions about college. They know from experience that if they choose it, Montgomery College will serve them well.

High Five!

Five Patton siblings—Bruce, Ben, Barry, Bobby, and Burt—were honored with this year's Milton F. (Sonny) Clogg Outstanding Alumni Achievement Award for their entrepreneurship and contributions to Montgomery College and the community. They own three successful business, including a CPA firm, a global electronics company, and a networking equipment distribution company.

Bobby '83, Burt '85, and Bruce '75 run Patton Electronics, the family business founded in 1984. From humble beginnings, the company has grown into a worldwide operation with headquarters in Gaithersburg, Md., and offices in Western Europe, Asia Pacific, Middle East/North Africa, and Latin America/Caribbean.

"Made in the U.S.A.," says company president Bobby. "We have more than 1,000 products in our portfolio and export to 120 countries—including hi-tech producers like Malaysia, Thailand, Hong Kong, Europe, India, and Vietnam." Among its many employees, Patton Electronics often provides paid

student internships for high school and Montgomery College students.

Ben Patton '77 heads his own firm, Patton and Braucht, P.C., a full-service accounting firm offering traditional accounting and tax services in Vienna, Va. Barry Patton '79 is founder and president of Data Connect Enterprises, a distributor of networking and communications equipment with subsidiaries in Texas and Pennsylvania serving the government and Fortune 1000 companies.

The Pattons carry on their family traditions of leadership, a solid work ethic, and giving back. Their long list of community activities includes serving on industry advisory councils and corporate boards, and supporting and volunteering for several local nonprofits, including the Montgomery County Infants and Toddlers Program, Montgomery County Preschool Education Program, Rockville Pregnancy Center/Medical Clinic, Young Life in Montgomery and Frederick counties, Amicus (a foreign exchange program for high school students), and Sunday school.

Tookie started volunteering with church, school, and service organizations. Taking on increasing responsibilities, she has served as president of the MC Alumni Association, chaired the Upcounty Citizens Advisory Board, and served on the board of The Dwelling Place.

Emilie manages the Child Passenger Safety Program for Montgomery County's Fire and Rescue Service. A lifetime member of the Emergency Nurses Association (ENA), she was named coordinator of the Montgomery County chapter of Safe Kids U.S.A.



Kaytee Mizell '49

Kaytee has helped children for three generations through her Montgomery County Recreation Department class and through her "Modeling Moppets" group. Performers from her classes have raised more than \$100,000 for children's charities.

Ted was part of several winning teams during the 1950s. In varsity baseball, he played outfield. In boxing, he was named best boxer and light heavyweight champion (1957). On the football team, he was a standout quarterback. He attended the University of Corpus Christi in Texas on a full scholarship.

During his freshman year, Marty helped the basketball team finish with a 23-5 record and win the Maryland Junior College Championship. As a sophomore, he averaged 26 points per game with a season high of 56 points scored in one game—against Wesley College in Dover, Delaware.

John led the cross-country team in 1972 and 1973. John (and alumnus Dave Lawrence) helped the '73 team take 11 first places in dual meets, earning them a dual meet record of 14 wins, 1 loss. John continues to run with the Montgomery County Road Runners Club and officiates in high school track meets.

With Adam as captain, the 1999 golf team finished fifth in the national NJCAA Division III conference. Adam was selected All Region XX, All Conference, and All-American golfer in 1999 and 2000. He coordinates the Andrew Haba Scholarship Golf Tournament and is a golf pro at a local course.

Let's start with the typical definition of alumni. We all know that most four-year colleges and universities typically consider only those who graduated an alumna/alumnus. Among community colleges, definitions of alumni differ, adding to the confusion. Here's what we say: the Montgomery College Alumni Association focuses on graduates and students who have completed 30 credits, but we also include anyone who ever completed a course among our Montgomery College alumni.

Here's our reasoning: there is no way to measure the impact that 6-, 12-, or 30-plus credits had in changing a student's life. For many, Montgomery College is the turning point in their education. Many complete the courses they need to transfer to a four-year institution to pursue a bachelor's degree or to find a new job. So if Montgomery College changed your life, and you want to continue your relationship with the institution, we gladly accept your participation.


Cuba

Milton F. (Sonny) Clogg '48 April 5, 2010

Milton F. "Sonny" Clogg '48, who devoted a great deal of time, talent, and treasure to the College over the years, passed away April 5. He was 86. Sonny entered Montgomery Junior College after completing his World War II military service. He became the College's first student president and a member of its first graduating class. He went on to earn law degrees from the American University's Washington College of Law, and then practiced real estate law in Rockville for more than 50 years. He retired in 2003, and was later employed by the Shady Grove Adventist Hospital Foundation.

Sonny assumed a lead role in creating the Alumni Association, and he served as its president. He also was a founding member and early chair of the Montgomery College Foundation, and he served as campaign chair for the Gudelsky Institute for Technical Education on the Rockville Campus. He was the first individual to endow a fully funded scholarship at Montgomery College, and he gave generously to the College throughout his life. He was granted Montgomery College's first honorary degree in 1996.

He received what was then known as the Outstanding Alumni Achievement Award in 1989, and in 2002 the Alumni Association renamed its highest award in honor of his outstanding service to Montgomery College. The Milton F. Clogg Outstanding Alumni Achievement Award—presented to alumni who have shown exemplary contributions over time to their professions, their communities, or the College—is the College's most prestigious award for former students.

East Meets West

How does an Italian-American air-conditioning business owner from Brooklyn meet a woman from Hue, Vietnam, and end up living in Maryland? Frank Chiaramonte and Quynh-Tram Le look back at how a series of coincidental meetings and missed opportunities led to good fortune for both.

Born and raised in Brooklyn, Frank Chiaramonte '96 owned an air-conditioning business, but wanted a more satisfying career. He sampled interior design courses at the Fashion Institute of Technology, then courses at TCI Technical College and the College of Staten Island. On advice from family friends in Maryland, Frank moved south and enrolled at Montgomery College. In fall 1992, he jumped into the mechanical engineering program.

At MC, Frank noticed he was at least 10 years older than fellow students, but he enjoyed his classes, made friends, and took a job on campus in the mathematics lab. With classmate Tony Santini '95, he established the Italian Club. Inspired by new friendships with Vietnamese students, Frank enrolled in Vietnamese language courses; he enjoyed practicing speaking it with them often.

Two years before Frank arrived at Montgomery College, Quynh-Tram Le '97 ("Tram") emigrated from Vietnam to Maryland, settling with her parents and siblings in Gaithersburg. After graduating from Gaithersburg High School in 1993, Tram enrolled at Montgomery College. She took a job on campus in the Technical Center's architecture/CAD lab.

Occasionally Tram assisted Frank in the math lab, but she avoided him as a math tutor. To her, it would have been embarrassing: "Frank talked loud and always tried to speak in Vietnamese," Tram recalls.

Frank learned how to dance from pal Thanh Tran, and asked Tram—in her native language—to go out dancing with him.

"He was too formal," says Tram. She turned him down.

On his next try, with encouragement from mutual friends Tracy Van Cao '99 ("Van") and husband Quan Dang '96, Frank asked Tram to meet for coffee. This time, at the Ba-Le restaurant on Rockville Pike, Tram agreed to a date. They made plans to meet at 9 p.m. at the Technical Center. Frank arrived at 9:05. According to Tram he was too late, so she left.

Weeks later, when Tram heard that National Institutes of Health (NIH)

was hiring students, she applied for a job and got one. Frank took a job there too. It wasn't until they ran into each other in the NIH parking lot that they discovered the coincidence. The pair met for picnic lunches frequently, and Tram started to see Frank in a new light.

"He was a dedicated student," says
Tram. "Our first date was to study at the
University of Maryland because MC's library
closed too early on the weekends."

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Alumni Identify Early Inventions, Visit New "Museum"



ne cold day in January, four Bliss Electrical School grads braved the weather to visit the newly renovated Commons Building on the Takoma Park/ Silver Spring Campus. There, they had a chance to inspect the "Bliss

collection" of electrical hardware started by their school's founder, Professor Louis D. Bliss, more than a century ago.

Howard Dixon '38, Bill Smeltzer '47, Gene Boone '48, and Tom Rooney '48 led the panel discussion describing the items they had used during their time at the Bliss School, and theorizing about others. The four met with the Alumni Office and College staff in a section of the building designed to display the Bliss collection.

Featured items of the day included laboratory devices and drafting kits used in classrooms; patent models of early electrical inventions; and samples of early vacuum tubes—the technology behind televisions and computers before transistors and microchips arrived. Other items were identified as communication gear of a bygone era, including a key and repeater used in railway stations and telegraph systems. They also enjoyed perusing the collection's class pictures, textbooks, and school souvenirs.

To prepare the collection for its debut in the new space, a team drawn from seven College departments arranged to record the Bliss alumni's commentary on the museum pieces, and on what life was like at the Bliss School. Maureen Kohl, exhibit coordinator for the College's School of Art and Design, sought the Bliss team's help in identifying items that were routinely used by Bliss students to plan the display. Elana Lippa of the Development Office noted that electrical engineering students continue to receive support from the scholarship Bliss alumni endowed in Professor Bliss's memory—the College's first endowed scholarship. A television program featuring the panel discussion is posted on the College's YouTube site. ■
