# **A PASSAGE TO INDIA**

ew people can honestly say they have given their life to service as Michelle Mays '02 has done. Since graduating from Montgomery College and completing the Montgomery Scholars honors program, Mays has woven her passion for nursing and volunteering into a fulfilling life overseas with the nonprofit Medecins Sans Frontieres (MSF), also known as Doctors Without Borders.

"Many different experiences and opportunities have led me here," Mays explained.

Her path led her to Manipur, a state in northeast India on the Myanmar (formerly Burma) border, where she recently completed her tour of service. Through five clinics, Mays and her colleagues provided care in the areas of reproductive health, mental health, nutrition, HIV, and tuberculosis.

"We see several hundred patients a day, so we keep quite busy," said Mays in an e-mail. "My job also spans several areas, so each day has new surprises."

In her role with MSF, Mays supervised the other nurses, health educators, and clinic staff. She was also in charge of health education and outreach, clinic management, and vaccinations.

"I have learned from the experiences here and from my colleagues. I'm proud to have worked with a talented and dedicated group," she said.

Mays' volunteer work and service led Montgomery College's Alumni Association to name her as the youngest alumna ever to receive the Milton F. Clogg Outstanding Alumni Achievement Award. Mays could not attend the award ceremony because she was working in India, but she sent a special video message to the Alumni Association, other honorees, and special guests. Her brother, Daniel Mays '08, accepted the award on her behalf. "The most valuable thing I gained from Montgomery College was a desire to learn and obtain an understanding of the world that is holistic, not just from one perspective..."

Mays credits her experience in the Montgomery Scholars honors program with influencing her career and education. "I started out at MC thinking that I would finish school as soon as possible—maybe an A.A. and that would be it," she recalled. "However, being a part of the Scholars made me want to go farther than that." Mays' eyes were opened as she studied and participated in the program's team-taught, interdisciplinary core curriculum during her freshman year.

"Dr. [Mary] Furgol unforgettably showed us a picture of the world and asked us to think about how we saw the world differently from when we first began Scholars," she explained. "My view had certainly changed because what I learned made me want to learn and experience more than I had before."

Since high school, Mays had planned on becoming a nurse, but her experience at Montgomery College and the Scholars program helped her realize that a career in a hospital would not be her best choice.

"The most valuable thing I gained from Montgomery College was a desire to learn and obtain an understanding of the world that is holistic, not just from one perspective or from what is readily apparent. In Scholars, we studied periods of history from the perspectives of philosophy, literature, history, and art history, which gave us a much more whole understanding of the period than one of these perspectives can allow on its own." Mays went on to obtain her nursing degree from the University of Maryland, followed by a job at Johns Hopkins Hospital for four years. During that time, she had the opportunity to work as a nurse in India for a local organization.

With an ever-growing interest in international relations and international work, she enrolled in what she considers the "perfect" graduate program for her—International Relations/Conflict Resolution—at The American University's Ethics, Peace, and Global Affairs program. It allowed her to combine her interests in ethics and philosophy, and to do graduate research in the West Bank and in Bosnia and Herzegovina on the issues of children and violent conflict, peace-building through health initiatives, and humanitarian negotiation.

Given her extensive preparation, Mays is not only trained and experienced to carry out her daily work in Manipur but she has the longterm, humanitarian vision necessary to ensure a healthy future for a community in need. But when it comes to her own future, she is still trying to figure out what is next: continuing her work for Doctors Without Borders or pursuing a doctorate degree.

Whatever Mays' future will bring, one thing is for certain—her experience and real-life education in India will serve her well.

"I will certainly be able to draw from what I have learned here for many years to come!"

# IN A CLASS BY THEMSELVES Two Select Honors Programs Celebrate Tenth Anniversaries

Michelle Mays '02, recently honored with the Milton F. Clogg Outstanding Alumni Achievement Award, participated in the Montgomery Scholars one of two signature honors programs now reaching a 10-year milestone.

### Montgomery Scholars: From Students To Citizens Of the World

n inaugural class of 25 Montgomery Scholars arrived on the Rockville Campus in the fall of 1999. The honors cohort program was new and untested; professors joked with the initial group of scholars, calling them "guinea pigs."

The academically rigorous program was designed to transfer students at the end of their sophomore year to the nation's finest colleges and universities. Scholars enjoy opportunities for research, study, and summer attendance at the University of Cambridge in England. At the heart of the program is a curriculum of specially designed, team-taught honors seminars.

"I think we, the professors, were more nervous, fearing we may have been too ambitious in our dreams," said Dr. Mary Furgol, director of the program. "Ten years and 275 students later, it's hard to realize how concerned we were."

The scholars program has received local and national awards and has been the center of written accolades in major newspapers including *The New York Times*. Honors faculty from

other colleges often seek out the Scholars program as they begin similar programs.

The Scholars have flourished academically at Montgomery College and have contributed to the College community through the student newspaper, on the athletic field, in numerous clubs, in student government, on the board of trustees, and as tutors and volunteers.

They have also succeeded at their transfer institutions, from the University of Maryland

to Georgetown to the University of Geneva. Nearly 30 percent are in graduate programs, and three scholars—Min Bui '01, Yiying (Coco) Tsai '02, and Ekta Laheri '03—have earned their doctorates. Four others are currently enrolled in doctoral programs.

Their social consciousness is reflected in a range of service, from volunteering as emergency medical technicians in Montgomery County to working for the Peace Corps, Teach for America, and Medecins Sans Frontieres.

The Montgomery Scholars program will hold a 10th anniversary celebration on August 21, 2010 (see Alumni Chapter News, page 9). Montgomery Scholars alumni are invited to check the Montgomery Scholars group on Facebook for updates.



### Macklin Business Institute: Educating Tomorrow's Business Leaders Today

t was just business as usual when the Macklin Business Institute (MBI) team walked off with top honors this fall at the Loyola Marymount University Intercollegiate Business Ethics Case Competition in Chicago. The Macklin students, pitted against college juniors and seniors, college graduates, MBA students, and MBA graduates, were outnumbered by more than five to one.

Winning local, regional, and national business school competitions comes naturally to MBI scholars, but the team of four almost didn't make it to the competition.

"We thought we had to pass up this opportunity for our students, but the director of Loyola's Center for Ethics stepped up with a \$3,200 grant



MBI was established 10 years ago with a \$1.26 million contribution by the late NASDAQ founder Gordon Macklin—the largest endowment for a community college at the time. In the past decade, about 170 students have graduated as Macklin scholars, with nearly all continuing their business education at institutions such as Georgetown University, Cornell, NYU, and the Robert H. Smith School of Business at the University of Maryland. One MBI focus is on experiential learning opportunities. Students thrive in an environment beyond classroom walls, managing the MBI Café at the Rockville Campus, which serves Starbucks<sup>®</sup> coffee. In fact, the Café's business plan that MBI students developed in 2003 is now an operational business that generates almost \$120,000 in yearly revenues. Profits go toward scholarship assistance for future Macklin scholars.

MBI is the first two-year college program to receive a grant from the NASDAQ OMX Educational Foundation, with \$400,000 recently committed to an endowed scholarship fund. Gifts such as this have helped MBI grow from a sophomore-level honors program to include a two-year program for entering freshmen.

## **2009 ALUMNI AWARDS** Retired Dean, Statesmen, and Athletes Honored

ichelle Mays '02, Maryland State Senator Royden P. Dyson '69, Dean Emeritus Thomas M. Logan Jr. '73, and Walter Kevin Hughes '80 were among eight former students honored at the Alumni Association's April 2009 Outstanding Alumni Awards program. A sense of achievement, service, and dedication to others in the larger community is shared by all four co-recipients of the Milton F. Clogg Outstanding Alumni Achievement Award.

The award, named in honor of Sonny Clogg '48, recognizes noteworthy alumni for exceptional service to the College, to their professions, or to their community.



Roy Dyson has served District 29 (Calvert, Charles, and St. Mary's counties) in the Maryland Senate since 1995. From 1981 to 1991, he represented Maryland's 1st District in the U.S. House of Representatives.

His concern for the people of southern Maryland, notably his support for the St. Clement's Island-Piney Point Museum in St. Mary's County, was noted in his award presentation.



Tom Logan went from a Montgomery College student to a 30-year faculty member and dean, retiring in 2004 as instructional dean for the Fine, Performing, and Visual Arts Department and as director

of the Robert E. Parilla Performing Arts Center. He was honored for service, since his retirement, as a trained volunteer with Court Appointed Special Advocates in West Virginia. He investigates cases of child neglect or abuse, and ensures that children removed from their homes have their basic needs met. He also assists children with behavioral or academic problems, and reads aloud to students, employing his skills as an amateur magician.



Kevin Hughes has used his public policy experience in both the State General Assembly and the Governor's Office to help enhance community college resources and to provide greater access for students.

As senior staff to the Maryland House of Delegates Ways and Means Committee, he worked with Del. Henry B. Heller '62 to improve funding formulas for Maryland community colleges. His work with the Maryland Association of Community Colleges also enabled him to provide valuable advice to college administrators on the legislative process.

#### **Athletic Hall of Fame**

The association inducted Mike Carroll '66, Jim Meehan '69, Dino Miltiadou '72, and Joe Adam '77 into the College's Athletic Hall of Fame.



Mike Carroll was captain of the College's first track and field team in 1966, which took both the Tri-State and Region 15 National Junior College Athletics Association (NJCAA) championships. He was

co-captain of the 1965–1966 cross-country team, which stayed in the top four in both Tri-State and NJCAA leagues. At Catonsville Community College, he coached cross-country, indoor and outdoor track and field, and was named NJCAA Coach of the Year in 1981. He also volunteers as head volleyball coach for the Howard County Special Olympics team.



Jim Meehan was a starter on the wrestling team from 1966 to 1968. He heads the physical education department at Olney Elementary School, and is the athletic director at Sherwood High School.

He was 1998 Maryland State Wrestling Association Man of the Year and was elected to the Maryland Public Schools Scholastic Athletic Association Hall of Fame in 2005.



Dino Miltiadou was the College's first soccer player to join the All-American Soccer team in 1970–1971. He led the NJCAA in scoring in both 1970 and 1971. An immigrant who left Cyprus at age 12, he

has lobbied on issues such as jobs for immigrants. He is currently general manager of Auto Wholesale Supermarket in Laurel, Md. He coaches the Pancyprians team in the Washington International Soccer League, and is president of Pancyprians of Metropolitan Washington, D.C.



Joe Adam played baseball from 1975 to 1977, making the All-American team in 1977. That year he had a 22-game hitting streak, led the national statistics with a batting average of .579, and finished the

season at .457. He has coached the Olney Boys and Girls Club's in-house and select baseball programs for the past 19 years. As coach, Adams led the Olney Pirates to 113 wins, 27 losses, and 3 ties over three seasons. His coaching tenure was highlighted by a 15-game winning streak.

In 2006, Nestor was notified that his Marine Corps Reserve unit would be needed in Iraq. He trained for six months at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, and then visited with his family in Maryland.

Nestor was planning a romantic sunset dinner around the July Fourth holiday at Baltimore's Inner Harbor to propose to Sherrie. Yet, upon seeing her, he realized he couldn't possibly wait. He asked her right then and there.

Just prior to Nestor leaving for Iraq, he bought Sherri a corgi, which they named Ine, to keep her company during his absence. The couple also has another "four-legged child," an orange tabby cat named Muffin, which they found abandoned at a gas station and rescued when she was five months old.

Nestor's first deployment with Company B, 4th Light Armored

Reconnaissance Battalion, 4th Marine Division was to Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. I gave him a bracelet my dad had worn in World War II when he was shot several times but survived.

Nestor's family and friends were concerned when he left, and he was leaving behind his beautiful fiancée Sherrie, a Montgomery College nursing student at the time. Security officers and other members of the College community regularly sent him care packages.

Company B was mobilized and sent to Iraq in October 2006 to conduct riverside reconnaissance, support, and security operations from Al-Qa'im to Fallujah. My dad's bracelet must still have had some magic left in it, as Nestor and his company returned home safely in April 2007 and subsequently were awarded the Navy Unit Citation the next year. Nestor and Sherrie had a beautiful wedding ceremony, and Sherrie, a 2009 graduate of the College's nursing program, now works in Holy Cross Hospital's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

In August 2009, orders arrived that Nestor and his unit were once again being deployed, this time to Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

As I and others complain about traffic, a favorite TV program being cancelled, or having to work extra hours, Nestor is among many who place their lives on the line in support of world peace and freedom.

We are very proud of all our servicemen and women overseas, but especially proud of our friend and co-worker Nestor Corvera. Keep the bracelet close, Nestor, and come home safe once again.

# **NEW HOME FOR BLISS COLLECTION**

Whether we are contacted by an alumnus or a family member, we hear that every Bliss student remembered Professor Louis D. Bliss as a changing force in their lives. Navy recruits who trained under him during World War II remember him as the first instructor to treat them like gentlemen.

In 1950, Professor Bliss decided to retire and close the technical school he had founded more than half a century ago. He sold the Bliss Electrical School—including its land and buildings in Takoma Park, Md.—to a newly formed Montgomery Junior College.

#### **The Bliss Collection**

Proud of his association with Thomas Edison and other pioneers of electricity, Professor Bliss kept a collection of early electrical devices near his office. Later, Montgomery College expanded his collection to include items from the Bliss school, including student projects, sports trophies, and fittingly, a telephone plugboard, which was replaced by an automatic switching system. Montgomery College's Commons building, a pavilion built on the site of an old Bliss dormitory, until recently, housed the Bliss Memorial Room—a lecture and reception space showcasing the Bliss collection. The Bliss school's alumni group, the Bliss Electrical Society, held annual spring luncheons in the Commons. The society held its final meeting in the 1990s, then merged into Montgomery College's Alumni Association.

Many recent additions to the collection come not from Bliss alumni but from their survivors and descendants—some of whom are Montgomery College alums themselves. Peg Vert '81 discovered a letter to her father, Charles Talley '31, that he kept with his Bliss application: the State of South Carolina demanded that he pay a tax on his radio receiver. Meredith Mancini '76 found that her father Quentin W. Mellander '42, had saved his workbooks and his 50-Year Club membership pin from the Bliss Electrical Society. And Marge Saller of Charlottesville, Va., traveled with her son to the new Takoma Park/Silver Spring Campus, to deliver a class photo showing her late husband Devereux N. Saller Sr. '41. After a two-year renovation, the Commons will reopen in 2010 with a new area designated as the Bliss Conference and Innovation Center. The new space has meeting rooms, faculty offices, and a lecture hall—all surrounding a new display area for the Bliss collection. Alumni staff, joined by the College's archives and facilities offices, are consulting Bliss grads on how best to display the collection in its new setting.

In 2010, Bliss alumni will be invited to join the College in a reopening ceremony to recognize their school's historical connection to Montgomery College, to see the new display of the Bliss collection, and to meet a new generation of electrical engineers and computer scientists who continue to benefit from the Louis D. 

Among the items he kept with his Bliss papers throughout his life was a letter he received from his home state's tax agency shortly before his acceptance at Bliss. His daughter, Peg Vert '81, shared copies of the papers with the Alumni Association.
